Only 21% of the US insurance providers who said IoT data is important to their strategy actually have a strategy for IoT in place.

An Uber self-driving car killed a woman in Arizona. The reactions to this should be interesting to watch; regulation, court cases, etc.

The UK government released a paper called "Secure by Design" to help manufacturers build in security for IoT devices.

Interesting car security camera called the Owl. It's a two-way camera that records everything that's happening inside and outside of your car.

Amazon is hiring more developers for its Alexa devices than Google is hiring for everything else.

## InfoSec

A US bill called the CLOUD Act could allow governments to do an end run around the Fourth Amendment.

POS malware, Prilex, has been adapted to target chip and PIN credit cards.

CTS-Labs, a security firm with rather dubious motivation, released numerous AMD vulnerabilities while giving AMD only 24 hours to respond before public disclosure. AMD is releasing firmware patches for these vulnerabilities.

The Cambridge Analytica story continues to evolve with governmental inquiries and potential warrants to raid CA offices. 50 million Facebook users could be affected.

Paypal released a list of over 600 companies they share customer data with.

Zenis ransomware encrypts your data and deletes your backups. Yay!

Millions of Android phones came pre-installed with the RottenSys malware which was disguised as a System Wi-Fi service application. Honor, Huawei Xiaomi, OPPO, Vivo, Samsung and GIONEE affected.

## Tech

Ford recalled 1.3 million cars because their steering wheels might fall off.

Porsche and Bugatti are using 3D printing for parts like brake calipers.

Plattsburgh, New York passed an 18-month moratorium on Bitcoin mining in the city due to using more than their monthly allotment of cheap hydroelectric power.

China will bar people with bad "social credit" from using planes and trains. Or they may have been doing this for a while now.
